- ^v Responsible person in the receiving organisation (supervisor): this person is responsible for signing the Learning Agreement, amending it if needed, supervising the student during the mobility and signing the Student Certificate.
- Any mobility will be considered as a "**mobility in digital skills**" when one or more of the following activities are practised by the student: digital marketing (e.g. social media management, web analytics); digital graphical, mechanical or architectural design; development of apps, software, scripts, or websites; installation, maintenance and management of IT systems and networks; cybersecurity; data analytics, mining and visualisation; programming and training of robots and artificial intelligence applications. Generic customer support, order fulfilment, data entry or office tasks are not considered in this category.
